**February Sangha Services** - Our Sangha Services (Sangha is the Sanskrit word for Buddhist community) is a traditional Jodo Shinshu service with chanting led by a Doshi, (a minister's assistant or a lay member from the Sangha). Following Sunday services, when there is not a minister, we have a Buddhism 101 book study and discussion. This month we will be reading from the Jodo Shinshu Guide, the new purple book from BCA.

**Ko Services** - The main activity of the Ko will focus on chanting. We will be learning how to chant the *Shoshinge* (Song of True Faith) found on page 33 of the Service Book. This is Shinran's poem from his *Kyogyoshinsho*. This is chanted every morning at the Nishi Hongwanji in Kyoto. The Shoshinge outlines the principal tenants of Shin Buddhism. We'll study proper pronunciation, musical notation and melody. We'll also discuss the meaning of the text. But the emphasis will be on the chanting. The goal is for people to experience the meditative peace, inner calm and the spiritual contentment that comes with group chanting. It will be on Wednesday evenings 6:30 to 7:30. We'll try it for 8 weeks and then evaluate whether or not to continue. Paul Vielle will lead this class.

**Northwest Buddhist Conference, Tacoma** – Sixteen temple members will be convening in Tacoma the weekend of February 18<sup>th</sup> - 20<sup>th</sup> to attend the 58<sup>th</sup> annual conference. This year, for the first time in twenty years, we will distribute the magnets and posters that we have made inviting everyone to join us here in Spokane for the 2006 Northwest Buddhist Conference.

There will be a regular Sangha service on Sunday, Feb 20<sup>th</sup> for those of you who will not be going to Tacoma.

**Toban (Temple Cleaning)** - Toban will be Saturday, February 26<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 - 11:00 a.m. This is the time to give through cleaning of the temple. Please join us.

**Bhante Seelawimala "What is Karma?"** - Come hear Bhante speak on Saturday afternoon, February 26<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 pm. He will just be returning from Sri

Lanka and will be giving a talk on karma. There is a \$5.00 donation at the door. This is a great opportunity to hear Bhante and learn more about Sri Lankan Buddhism.

**Sunday, February 27<sup>th</sup>** - There are many events taking place at the temple this day. We start off with Introduction to Buddhism at 9:30 am followed by a service at 10:30 am. Bhante Seelawimala will be conducting our service that day. Following the service will be a pot luck lunch. We will provide hot rice and are asking you to bring either a hot dish to put over the rice, a salad, or a dessert. There will be a sign up list at the temple.

Castro from the Seattle Betsuin. One project he is working hard on is bringing back the Shotsuki-Hoyo, look for more in this newsletter on updating our records.

In February a group of delegates will be attending the Buddhist Convention in Tacoma and presenting us as the next year's convention host. Wish us luck! Our Guest speaker on Feb. 26 will be Bhante from the Institute of Buddhist Studies. His talk will be at 3 pm "What is Karma?" Introduction to Buddhism on Sunday Feb 27<sup>th</sup> will be at 9:30 a.m. with a service at 10:30 followed by a pot luck lunch. We look forward to hearing Bhante's experiences in Sri Lanka. He was visiting his temple there when the tsunami hit. His temple is inland and safe, so his Temple was able to help out in sorting donations and doing services. Thank you to the monetary donations our temple has received for the Tsunami Relief, we are sending our donations to Bhante so it can go directly where it is needed.

Many thanks to George Kawahara for his help in inviting guest ministers.

Recently, the temple's Death Record (*Kako-Cho*) was found. It contains all the death records from 1984 to 1991. We have no death records since 1991. If you have a deceased relative, who was a temple member and who died since 1991, please see either **Fumi Uyeji** or **Paul Vielle**. They will collect and record the information. We plan to restart the Shotsuki-Hoyo services at the Spokane Buddhist Temple once the *Kako-Cho* is updated. Once each month, during the Shotsuki-Hoyo service, the names of temple members who died in that month will be read aloud. Family members may then offer incense to honor the memory of their deceased loved-one.
